Fact Sheet: Supporting a person who is deciding whether to report to Police

Reporting a sexual assault to police is not an easy option. It can be re-traumatising to go over details, and, consequently, the person may be very anxious and reluctant to report.

The decision to report a sexual assault to Police is the decision of the person who has been assaulted.

Your role is to support the person in their decisionmaking; it is not to make the decision.



If you can help the person feel safe and in control of their situation during this time, they will find reporting less stressful.

If the person wants to discuss with Police prior to reporting, they can contact their local police station or phone Tasmania Police on 131 444. They can also make an appointment to speak with a Police Officer in person.

You can accompany the person when they make a report, if they wish. Alternatively, a support worker from the regional sexual assault service can accompany the person when they make a report.





Supporting a person who is deciding whether to report to Police

The person does not have to report immediately following an assault, but early reporting may result in effective collection of evidence. They can always provide more information later.

Note that there are no time limitations on reporting sexual abuse to Tasmania Police.



At any time in an investigation, the person can choose not to proceed.

Communication issues

If the person needs a support person with them to make a report, arrange that immediately.

If the person routinely uses communication aids, make sure they are available to help them discuss options and make their decision.
